



Youthful Voices Storytelling Contest Guideline

Eligibility: Florida students in grades 1 through 12 who have not previously won the FSA Youthful Voices Storytelling Contest are eligible to participate.

Guidelines:

1. Entries must be a 5 – 7 minute unedited video of a selected story (folktale, fairytale in public domain) and uploaded to YouTube with a private link.
2. Please follow the FSA Youth Voices Rubric (attached) to receive insight into the judging process.
3. Entries must be received by **November 16, 2024**
4. Fill out the entry form at <https://flstory.com/festival/youthful-voices/>
5. Upload the video to the entry form or supply a link to the video

Prior to the FSA Festival: The Youthful Voices committee will judge the recorded entries following the FSA YV Rubric and will select five (5) finalists. All participants and the sponsoring organization or individual adult sponsor will be notified of the outcome of the contest by **Dec. 1, 2024** via email and phone.

At the Festival: January 26, 2025: After a day of special workshops and activities, the six finalists will share their entry stories at the 2025 Florida Storytelling Festival, Mt. Dora, Florida, during the Youthful Voices Concert on the Main Stage, **Saturday, January 26, 2025 at 7:00 p.m.**

A parent or guardian (21+) must accompany each youth storyteller to the FSA Festival. The student will receive the Virginia Rivers Youthful Voices Scholarship, which includes Festival registration, 1 night lodging, and a Saturday night banquet for the student and one accompanying adult.

Meals (other than Saturday night dinner) and transportation to the FSA Festival in Mt. Dora, Florida are NOT included. Other family members attending will need to purchase festival admission and banquet tickets.

- One night accommodation at the Lakeside Inn on Saturday
- Saturday night banquet for the youth teller and **one** adult chaperone
- Participation in the Youthful Voices Concert on Saturday Evening, Jan. 26 at 7:00 p.m.
- Specialized workshops that will enhance storytelling skills
- Storytelling concerts by outstanding nationally recognized storytellers
- Individual coaching/mentoring with a master storyteller on two Zoom sessions
- Socialize with other youth tellers and storytellers
